

NC Lead and Healthy Homes Outreach Task Force November 30, 2016 Quarterly Meeting – Summary Notes

Summary:

On November 30, 2016 twenty-six lead and healthy homes professionals met at the NC Botanical Garden in Chapel Hill for the quarterly NC Lead and Healthy Homes Outreach Task Force meeting.

Attendees provided brief program updates and participated in a discussion about current lead guidelines. After these updates, two presentations were given by guest speakers. The first presentation was on *Potential Lead Exposure Pathways in NC* by Diego Calderon-Arrieta, Duke MEM student, and Jordan Kozal, Duke PhD student. The second presentation was about the *Orange County Healthy Homes Program and Community and Clinical Partnerships* by Kiana Redd, Healthy Communities Healthy Homes Coordinator, and Mary Crocker, UNC Pediatrics – Pulmonology. Research Associate Megan Hoert Hughes in the UNC IE Environmental Resource Program coordinates meetings of the task force, and this meeting was supported by funding from the National Institute of Environmental Health Sciences.

Local Updates:

Forsyth County – Lynn Stone, Craig Bethel, Sarah Frantz

- 4 confirmed level of concerns, 2 investigations, 1 confirmed EBL (parents are not cooperating)
- Supplemental address for EBL child, 10-12 kids in work flow with level of 8 and above, parents are bringing them back in for follow-up
- Participated in community outreach at car seat check for Hispanic families in conjunction with Wake Forest Baptist, provided car seats and booster seats if current seat was incorrect, helped with paperwork and provided green cleaning kits
- Participated in boy scout health fair and health fair at Head Start facility for parents, checked BLLs while they were at fair
- Craig Bethel is learning lead program, he's been to SOP class, Sarah Frantz working in all areas of environmental health, going into local doctors' offices to help with tests and questions

Chatham County – Nellie Benitez, Elizabeth Fridley, and Ann Lowry

- 3 confirmed EBLs, 2 investigations, 1 more coming up
- Participating in community outreach, just finished street fair in October and Super
 Saturday with Santa for children with special needs and their families is this Saturday

Currently monitoring 40 kids in NCLEAD

Duke Children's Hospital – Barbara Donadio

 Continuing to screen kids at 12 and 24 months covered by Medicaid or in a risk category, follow-up for repeat testing

Reinvestment Partners – Lorisa Seibel

- More than 200 home visits last year, dust sampling
- Goal next year is to work on more follow up and prevention, talking with doctors and health care providers about doing more testing, following up with home visits and assessments
- Providing paint stabilization with small amount of money received from the city, will help a few homes but there is a real lack of safe affordable housing, encouraging section 8 lead safe work with landlords and authority
- Working with schools, met with superintendent, determining how to deal with schools with chipping paint, how to test to make sure they are safe

PEACH - Beatrice Jackson

- In process of identifying homes that are in need of remediation, wants to cast a broad net, utilized organizations that are in place to do outreach, increasing knowledge level of individuals
- Thinking about ways to further engage the community, block party brought young people that were interested in the impacts of lead, she wants to get tweens involved

Durham County – Warren Richardson

- Warren is new to Durham Health Department (though he worked many years for the lead program at DHHS), he knows that there are a lot of outreach groups that deal with lead and he is interested in scheduling time to meet and understand how the health department can assist these programs
- He is in the process of going through the current cases, lots of information missing in NCLEAD, trying to clean it up

Durham County – Lakieta Sanders

- She wants parents to understand why it is important to have kids tested, she reached 15-20 parents in a session with translators available as well as computers to look up recalls and lead sorting sources kit
- New pediatric nutritionist in Durham, she is meeting with her tomorrow to determine how they can work together to provide kids with nutrition assessments

Cumberland County – Daniel Ortiz and Diana Blue

- Finished 1 elementary school investigation which was clear
- 160 lead tests for kids

- started another elementary school investigation yesterday with dust wipe samples, some cork boards tested high in lead, report will be out soon
- Starting childcare center investigation in the 1st week of January as well as elevated BLL home investigation

Wake County – Christy Klaus

- 6 investigations, 1 is elementary school with plaster walls in hallways that are in poor shape, also some doors and vent covers are chipping
- Another investigation on home built in 1900s, renovator only finished half of the renovation work and left lead dust everywhere, dog even had lead dust on his fur, she referred them to lead hazards control unit
- 4 children of Indian descent with high lead levels, they are living in newer homes, she used Kim Gaetz's survey and found that one child was consuming turmeric and masala containing lead, child was consuming products multiple times each day, one child was wearing Vibhuti on a daily basis (an ash worn on the forehead for ceremonial purposes), children are also exposed to brass keys, Fawn asked if Christy involved Agriculture Department in spice recalls? Christy said that she has called them but they are dealing with cheese and other products and she didn't hear back so she works directly with FDA instead

Get the Lead Out – Pete Hubicki

- Pete does a lot of work with lead, asbestos and radon testing
- Hearing people concentrate on lead makes him want to look at other things too, maybe look for asbestos and insects and mold while looking for lead, look at all HH aspects instead of just lead, composite of healthy homes
- Lead cement and brick can confuse the XRF, could get false positive, good to also take a paint sample, plaster gives lots of false positives, also can be asbestos in plaster

City of Charlotte - Sherry Rathod

 Neasha Graves announced on behalf of Sherry that the City of Charlotte was awarded its new HUD lead and Healthy Homes Control grant

has certified about 225 individuals, RRP program went into effect in 2010

- Melanie has been cleaning up data in NCLEAD
